Job Corps' mission is to educate and train highly motivated young people for successful careers in the nation's fastest-growing industries. Students can earn college credits through Job Corps. Job Corps is tuition-free to eligible young people and provides housing, meals, basic medical care, a living allowance, hands-on training, and preparation for a career.

After students complete the program, Job Corps offers transitional support services, such as help finding employment, housing, and transportation. Job Corps graduates either enter the workforce or an apprenticeship, go on to higher education, or join the military.

Job Corps offers career technical training in 11 high-growth industries:

YOUTH SERVICES

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act

The federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Title 1B Youth Program provides services to youth ages 14-24. The main focus of the Youth Program is to increase longer-term academic and occupational learning opportunities. Youth services are provided to in-school youth ages 14-21.

The Youth Program is designed to prepare youth to either enter post-secondary education, training or employment upon completion of their secondary education.

In-School Youth

In-School Youth is an individual who is attending school, not younger than age 14 or older than age 21, low-income, and has one or more of the following barriers:

- Basic skills deficient
- An English language learner
- An offender
- A homeless child or youth, a runaway, in foster care or has aged out of the foster care system, or in an out-of-home placement
- Pregnant or parenting
- A youth who is an individual with a disability
- An individual who requires additional assistance to enter or complete an educational program or to secure or hold employment



Need Help With Your Grades?

The Youth Program provides tutoring and case management services to improve the study and academic skill for youth ages 14-21. Youth will benefit from tutoring, study skills training and instruction leading to the completion of secondary schooling including dropout prevention strategies.

Skills to Pay the Bills

“Skills to Pay the Bills: Mastering Soft Skills for Workplace Success,” is a curriculum developed by the Department of Labor’s Office of Disability Employment Policy, focused on teaching “soft” or workforce readiness skills to youth, including youth with disabilities.

Created for youth development professionals as an introduction to workplace interpersonal and professional skills, the curriculum is targeted for youth ages 14 to 24 in both in-school and out-of-school environments. The basic structure of the program is comprised of modular, hands-on, engaging activities that focus on six key skill areas:

- Communication
- Enthusiasm and attitude
- Teamwork
- Networking
- Problem solving and critical thinking
- Professionalism

Job Readiness Training

The Youth Program offers eligible youth the opportunity to receive job readiness training, which consists of learning the fundamental expectations that employers have with employees, such as, dressing appropriately for the job, arriving to work ahead of time, notifying the employer of an absence or tardiness, as well as how to work with others.

Search For An After-School Job

The Youth Program offers eligible youth the opportunity to gain paid or unpaid work experience with a participating employer in your community. Job readiness training is provided to any eligible youth whether or not they are entering a work experience activity.



Eligibility Requirements

Some of these services have eligibility requirements. An individual must be between the ages of 14-24, low income and meet at least one barrier to employment.
